Subject Specific Vocabulary	
civilisation	Societies achieve an advanced stage of development and organisation
Empire	An extensive group of states or countries ruled over by a single monarch.
peasantry	smallholders and agricultural labourers of low social status
parliament	a legislative body of government
Spanish Armada	The Spanish Armada was a fleet of 130 ships that sailed from Lisbon in late May 1588 to invade England.
banquet	an elaborate and formal meal for many people.
jousting	a medieval sporting contest in which two opponents on horseback, typically knights, fight with lances.
wattle and daub	A material formerly or traditionally used in building walls, consisting of a network of interwoven sticks and twigs covered with mud or clay.
Field of the Cloth of Gold	a royal summit meeting at a site in Balinghem – It was a lavish extremely expensive display of wealth on both sides from 7 to 24 June 1520, between King Henry VIII of England and King Francis I of France.

Key people, facts and sticky knowledge
Henry VIII defeated Richard III at the Battle of Bosworth and came to power in 1485.
Henry VIII married 6 times and his wives were: Katherine of Aragon, Ann Boleyn, Jane Seymour, Anne of Cleves, Katherine Howard and Jane Parr.
Henry VIII lived in many palaces but his favourite was Hampton Court Palace .
William Shakespeare was a famous playwright born in the Tudor times. His first play was performed in 1591.
Sir Francis Drake was a famous explorer. He was one of the first to circumnavigate the world.
